### THE GREATER AKRON AQUARIUM SOCIETY

WHO ARE WE? We are a local group of aquatic enthusiasts. Formed in 1952, the Greater Akron Aquarium Society is a non-profit, non-commercial organization. Our membership ranges from the beginning hobbyist to the advanced aquarist with many years of experience. The goals of our club are to promote the care, study, breeding and exhibition of aquarium related aquatic life and to promote interest in the aquarium hobby.

MEETINGS: Our meetings are held on the first Thursday of each month at 8:00 p.m. at the Mogadore Community/Senior Center, 3857 Mogadore Road, Mogadore, Ohio. It is located East of Route 532 across from McDonald's in the former post office building (see map on inside back cover) Visitors are always welcome, it costs absolutely nothing to attend a meeting and look us over.

MEMBERSHIP: The cost is only \$750 for adults, \$10 for a couple or a family (includes children under 10 years of age) and \$5.00 for a junior membership (10 to 17 years) Membership provides an opportunity to socialize with other that share your interests, a subscription to our bi-monthly magazine, library usage and more.

AGENDA: Our meeting agenda is simple and informal. The meeting will begin at 8:00 p.m. with a short business meeting. Immediately following is the program for the evening which usually lasts about 45 minutes. Our programs consist of a speaker, slide program, movie or perhaps a panel discussion always on a particular subject related to the hobby or various species of fish. Following the program is a short refreshment break. After which the winners of the Bowl Show are announced, the Breeder's Award Program fish are auctioned and tickets are drawn for the equipment and book raffles.

THE BOWL SHOW: Each month members can bring in fish for specific classes to compete for first, second and third place awards. The charge for each entry is only \$.25. Members also compete for annual awards by accumulating wins throughout the year.

BREEDER'S AWARD and HORTICULTURE AWARD PROGRAMS: members can receive recognition for spawning species of fish or propagating aquatic plants. All that is required is to turn in a minimum of six fry from the spawn that are between 30 and 90 days old. Members earn certificates for each species and can work towards plaques in different categories.

LIBRARY: At the library table are a number of books and other publications covering all areas of the aquarium hobby. Members may borrow the books for a month at a time. Also each month several books are raffled off.

EQUIPMENT RAFFLE: The raffle table has such items as tanks, fish food and aquarium accessories that are donated by national manufacturers, area dealers or purchased by the Society. Tickets may be purchased by anyone attending the meeting. Save your losing tickets for the Christmas Party raffle.

ANNUAL SHOW: The Ultra-Aqua show is held the first weekend of August at the Tallmadge community Center. This has become one of the largest all-species tropical fish shows in North America. It is an international gathering of hobbyists to display their fish in class competition, talk fish and to learn about the hobby from each other.

TANK TOPICS: is published on a bi-monthly basis for the members of the Greater Akron Aquarium Society. Articles and comments for this publication are welcome and encouraged. Such articles are to be submitted no later than the board meeting prior to publication. 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



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### Black Angels

I bought a bag of six, nickel-sized black-lace angelfish about a year ago at a local fish auction. They were nice looking, but nothing special. I had been wanting some for some time and the price was right, so.....



I put them in a 55 gallon tank with 12 Koi angels, slightly larger, sponge filter, pH 7.8 and temperature about 76F. I've raised a lot of angels in my 45 years of fish-keeping and they are not fussy about water conditions in general. Just keep it clean and do regular water changes and they should be happy. They were fed frozen Brine Shrimp, quality flake food containing both animal and vegetable matter and the occasional bit of live food (earthworms and white worms mostly).

Over the following months the Koi angels reached fifty-cent body size and began to pair off. I removed 3 pairs and gave the other six fish away. At this time the Black angels were growing steadily, but more slowly than the Koi's and were showing no signs of pairing.

Finally I noticed 2 of the angels were staying together and seemed to always be around the power filter tube. The other four were grouped together on the other side of the tank.

I carefully watched the pair for the next few days and noticed as they would move up and down the filter tube picking at the surface and apparently cleaning it of foreign material. As they diligently worked on the tube they would occasionally take a break to chase any of the other fish that wandered too close. They would also use these times for strengthening their pair-bond by doing the fin flaring, shimmy and shake cichlid dance.

The next day I went downstairs for the morning feed before work and noticed the young pair slowly and carefully laying eggs and fertilizing them on the filter tube they had so carefully cleaned the day before. I returned later that day and observed they had completed the spawning and now were actively guarding the clutch of about 140-150 clear eggs.

About 4 days after the eggs were laid they began to hatch. They hung from the filter tube by a tiny thread attached to their head. The parents kept moving the fry over the next couple of days and the fry went from the "hopping" stage to free-swimming. At this time I began feeding baby Brine Shrimp, both live and de-encapsulated, supplemented with Egg Yolk enriched flake food.

At about four weeks the fry began getting a more adult diet ...Beef Heart, finely chopped earthworms, chopped white worms as they began growing into that familiar angel shape.

When they reached dime-size at about 9-10 weeks it was quite a sight to see 100+ small angels swimming all around the tank with the parents watching. It was also time to move them to a larger grow-out tank for the next couple of months.

The preceding events are actually a compilation of about 10 spawns before this pair got it right. They would spawn and eat the eggs, spawn and watch the eggs start wiggling and eat the fry, spawn and watch the eggs hatch and eat the eggs until, at last they got it right and managed to raise a clutch of eggs to free-swimming.

This particular pair is also the most aggressive angels I have ever owned. They are now about silver dollar sized and when have eggs or fry they will try their best to get through the glass to your face. When they are fed their heads and backs will come out of the water to literally take the food right out your fingers.

All in all a nice, young, good-looking pair of black angels that spawn about every 10-12 days. If you get the chance, try some, you may find you like them.

In 1997 I took a trip to Mexico with Derek Lambert to collect livebearers, especially swordtails. Anyway, back then I told anyone who listened to my stories that I would go back to Mexico in a heartbeat. Well, many heartbeats later I got my opportunity.

I have known Gil Rosenthal for a number of years now having interacted with him back when he was a recipient of the Vern Parish Fund grant and then a speaker at the 1999 American Livebearer Association Convention and more recently at the 2006 Convention. Through the years I have supplied Gil with a little "hobby experience / swordtail maintenance information" for lots of cool research articles on swords. During one of those email exchanges, the return to Calnali was incubated. Some of the ongoing special projects supported through CICHAZ are

"mate choice and evolutionary genetics in hybrid zones" (mainly *Xiphophorus malinche* and *Xiphophorus birchmanni* hybrid zones), "evolutionary ecology of mate choice in swordtails (genus *Xiphophorus*)", and "ecological effects of an introduced cichlid, *Archocentrus nigrofasciatus*, on



native Mexican cichlid communities".

Anyway, that is probably enough background so we will move on. My trip to Mexico was pretty uneventful. No point in talking about delaying the trip due to passport problems or missed flights due to being practically being stripped searched at the airport. I did make my flight from Atlanta to Mexico City and the signs within the terminal directing me to buses. I caught a 1<sup>st</sup> class bus to Pachuca where I caught a local bus to where you turn off the 105 Highway to head to Calnali. Although I was worried that I would miss my stop, it was quite easy to get that far. Now I was only 24 km from my destination. I got into a taxi at the bus stop and off we went to Aguazarca, a neighborhood outside of the town of Calnali. We arrived in the neighborhood as a thunderstorm was ending. They left me at a local taco stand where no one spoke English. Before long the owner's nephew who was well schooled in hip hop English showed up and directed me to CICHAZ. I was only 4 houses away. I

knocked at the door and the grad students let me into the candle lit building. Unfortunately, the power was knocked out by the storm. Gil showed up a little later and I sat in on a briefing of the next day's events while eating a bowl of tasty soup.





This is the point where I should probably introduce the cast of characters at CICHAZ besides Gil. Rhonda (his wife) and Carmen (their daughter) were also part of CICHAZ making it an extended home, not just a field station. Chi-Cheng Wat and Zach Culumber were two grad students working on projects. Zach Cress was a grad student as well as being the laboratory's technician. I would like to thank Gil & Rhonda for allowing me to be part of the CICHAZ experience and thank everyone for making me feel welcome during

my stay.

Although I could write a narrative of the day by day activities, I am choosing to write what could happen in a typical day. The one thing that never changed was the early morning activities. People wandered down

for breakfast between 6 to 8:30 AM. Not that there was a 2 hour gap in wake up times but rather if the day's activities called for getting up at 6 AM that is what happened. If the night before was a late one and there was no pressing need to get up then people got a little extra rest.

Breakfast was cereal, oatmeal or leftovers; whatever you decided to fix. Afterwards the students handle the tank maintenance, water changes and setting up new tanks for fish to be collected that day. During this portion of the day I scooped out fish and took photographs of them in the outside tanks set up for chemical cue testing. Although there was plenty of room inside for setting up a photography tank, the use of natural light and no need for a flash made outside the better spot for photos.

From here the rest of the day was governed by how many collection spots were we attempting for the day and how far we needed to travel? You could be pretty much assured that one or two collecting spots were on the agenda of any one day. A full day of collecting would mean three or four locations. Most locations called for around an hour or more of collecting time with the associated travel time between the spots.

Collecting followed the same fire drill; load the truck with coolers, load the traps & bait buckets (if they are not already in the truck), load the trap bait (sounds



better than bring the bag of dog food), bring maps, bring cameras & video gear, and bring any personal stuff you want to take (cameras, swim trunks, drinking water, etc). At that point it was time for us to load ourselves in the truck and be on our way. Unfortunately for us traveling was not fast going. Although most of the roads were fairly smooth, most travel was up and down winding every which way. A short trip as the crow flies usually turned into a half hour to an hour drive. It was OK. There were lots of beautiful scenery and the slug-bug or donkey game to keep everyone busy. Slug-bug is pretty self explanatory. The donkey game awarded points to the first person to spot donkey or mules and subtracted points for calling donkey when in fact it was a horse or cow. The main purpose of the games seemed to keep everyone awake so they could help keep the driver awake; the days were sometime long and an alert driver on a twisty road was a good thing.

Once we landed at a potential site then everyone had their jobs. Gil went

down to the water and started scouting out swordtails and potential sites to place the traps. Chi-Cheng got out the video equipment and snorkel & mask to find adult swords. She and Gil picked out the site then she set up the camera. The Zachs set up traps with bait and began placing the traps in the water. I helped then started taking photos. If the water was too shallow to effectively video tape, then Chi-Cheng helped set up traps.

Once the traps were set then came some free time for photography or floating in pools of cool mountain water or sitting in the shade. The traps were periodically checked then re-set or moved to different locations. The guys would scout out up and down streams for pools to reposition traps. There really was not a lot of time for dawdling. Usually there was a set number of



fish to be collected at the site before it was time to move on to the next site or time to head back to the field station. Whether the fish were for DNA investigations or behavioral work or ultimate transport back to the University would make a difference in whether only adults were needed or a mix of adults and juveniles would work. Once fish were used in the behavioral work, they needed to be taken back to their collection sites and released.



During my stay at CICHAZ a variety of studies were in progress. Predator / prey studies were taking place that look at the response of populations to potential kingfisher predation. The other study was looking at the thermal tolerances of hybrid populations and comparing that information with tolerance testing of pure populations of *Xiphophorus malinche* and *Xiphophorus birchmanni*. Another study in preparation while I was there was looking at the effects of chemical cues on the behaviors of the fish. All interesting studies that will help further define these Panuco swordtails.

Although the thermal tolerance studies kept us busy most nights, we also made adjustments for special events. We needed to reschedule one evening's work around a local festival that featured "Luchadors". 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
