THE GREATER AKRON AQUARIUM SOCIETY

WHO ARE WE? We are a local group of aquatic enthusiasts. Formed in 1952, the Greater Akron Aquarium Society is a non-profit, non-commercial organization. Our membership ranges from the beginning hobbyist to the advanced aquarist with many years of experience. The goals of our club are to promote the care, study, breeding and exhibition of aquarium related aquatic life and to promote interest in the aquarium hobby.

MEETINGS: Our meetings are held on the first Thursday of each month at 8:00 p.m. at the Mogadore Community/Senior Center, 3857 Mogadore Road, Mogadore, Ohio. It is located East of Route 532 across from McDonald's in the former post office building. Visitors are always welcome, it costs absolutely nothing to attend a meeting and look us over.

MEMBERSHIP: The cost is only \$7.50 for adults, \$10 for a couple or a family (includes children under 10 years of age) and \$5.00 for a junior membership (10 to 17 years) Membership provides an opportunity to socialize with other that share your interests, a subscription to our bi-monthly magazine, library usage and more.

AGENDA: Our meeting agenda is simple and informal. The meeting will begin at 8:00 p.m. with a short business meeting. Immediately following is the program for the evening which usually lasts about 45 minutes. Our programs consist of a speaker, slide program, movie or perhaps a panel discussion always on a particular subject related to the hobby or various species of fish. Following the program is a short refreshment break. After which the winners of the Bowl Show are announced, the Breeder's Award Program fish are auctioned and tickets are drawn for the equipment and book raffles.

THE BOWL SHOW: Each month members can bring in fish for specific classes to compete for first, second and third place awards. The charge for each entry is only \$.25. Members also compete for annual awards by accumulating wins throughout the year.

BREEDER'S AWARD and HORTICULTURE AWARD PROGRAMS: members can receive recognition for spawning species of fish or propagating aquatic plants. All that is required is to turn in a minimum of six fry from the spawn that are between 30 and 90 days old. Members earn certificates for each species and can work towards plaques in different categories.

LIBRARY: At the library table are a number of books and other publications covering all areas of the aquarium hobby. Members may borrow the books for a month at a time. Also each month several books are raffled off.

EQUIPMENT RAFFLE: The raffle table has such items as tanks, fish food and aquarium accessories that are donated by national manufacturers, area dealers or purchased by the Society. Tickets may be purchased by anyone attending the meeting. Save your losing tickets for the Christmas Party raffle.

ANNUAL SHOW: The Ultra-Aqua show is held during the summer at the Tallmadge community Center. This has become one of the largest all-species tropical fish shows in North America. It is an international gathering of hobbyists to display their fish in class competition, talk fish and to learn about the hobby from each other.

TANK TOPICS: is published on a bi-monthly basis for the members of the Greater Akron Aquarium Society. Articles and comments for this publication are welcome and encouraged. Such articles are to be submitted no later than the board meeting prior to publication. All articles may be reprinted as long as the author(s) and GAAS are given proper credit and two copies of the publication containing the reprint are sent to GAAS. President's Message



Toeing the Line with Allotoca goslinei

Yes it's that time again, for another one of those articles about an obscure goodeid livebearer, Allotoca goslinei. As it is with a lot of other livebearers from Mexico, A. goslinei is critically endangered in the wild. Originally the species comes from the Pacific slope in the Rio Potrero Grande, Rio Ameca, and the upper part of the Rio Ameca basin around Jalisco Mexico. They were first described in 1987 by Smith and Miller and were named in honor of Dr. William

A. goslinei has the stocky elongated body shape typical of most goodeids, females can grow to 6 cm just shy of 2 ½ inches, while males stay slightly smaller. The head is pointed with an upturned mouth, for feeding at the surface. The leading edge of the dorsal fin starts well back on the body, about even with the anal fin; the dorsal fin of the male is larger and well developed, and the male also has an andropodium. In case any of you has forgotten the andropodium is the

on their sides. This tends to make me think that the banding is a fright or stress marking. The body coloration is much the same for both sexes; the upper half is brown to golden-brown with some dark mottling, the lower half to the belly is pale tan. The gill plates are somewhat translucent as they appear to be a rosy red color, due to the gills beneath them; there is also an iridescent patch on the upper front of the gill plate. Along the midline of the body from just behind the eye to the caudal peduncle, there are a few larger dark spots; over these spots is some bluish iridescence which varies from just a sprinkling to almost a solid band. On to the fins, the anal fin is an opaque white color, while the dorsal and caudal fins are not quite as opaque with a yellow tint.



A. Gosline. The natural habitat is shallow waters up to or depending on how you look at it down to a depth of 4 feet, with a slow current to none during the dry season. Substrates consisted of gravel, rocks, sand, and mud, with vegetation of filamentous algae and patches of floating plants.

This is a peaceful, timid species and it is recommended that it be kept in a species tank. Water parameters should be: Ph of 7-7.6 with a hardness of 5-20 dGH, at temperatures ranging from 68-74 degrees F, drops in temperature and marked fluctuations in water quality are not tolerated.

modified anal fin the males use to pass sperm packets to the females. Female goodeids cannot store sperm like the poeciliids can; they must mate for each spawning. Speaking of spawning the gestation period is around 60 days, and a brood can consist of up to 20 fry 1 cm in size. The books also recommend that they be spawned in pairs. The fry are sexually mature at 3 months of age.

Their common name is the banded goodeid; according to the book they have a series of up to 15 vertical bands on the side of the body. I never noticed any bands on the males or females I have, and only when I have caught them for photos have I seen a few faint bands

I first had the opportunity to obtain some A. goslinei at the American Livebearer Association convention in 2009; there were some in the auction but they went for way more than I was willing to pay. Oh well, I will just have to keep looking and hoping. Well in the fall of 2009 I went to the Erie Aquarium Society's auction in Erie, Pa. and to my surprise there were four bags, each containing a young pair, scattered on the tables. The first one came up and someone bid \$3 so I went \$4, and that was all the bids, so I got at least a pair, but since the seemed to be very little interest there was hope for getting more. After most of the auction I wound up getting all four pairs for

a grand total of \$14, needless to say I was quite pleased. The only way to get some of the more unusual and rare species is to make a road trip to out of state auctions, or national conventions, so that is what I do. I came home with my prize and separated them by sex, to grow them up to adult size and condition them for spawning. The 4 males and 4 females each got a 10 gallon tank with sand substrate, floating plastic plants, and a sponge filter. Being omnivores they were fed flake, frozen blood worms, and very small floating pellets, they grew well and looked good.

By early summer I decided to put them outside in one of my 110 gallon tubs behind my garage, with hornwort, water lilies, and various marginal plants, I fed them flake food about every other day, and let Mother Nature take care of the rest. I couldn't see putting just 1 pair in a 110 gallon tub so all 4 pairs went in. I noticed when I fed them that there seemed to be only the adults, I never saw any fry, well maybe they just hide real well, I can only hope. In mid fall before

the temperature got too low they were netted out of the tub, all 8 of the adults, at least I didn't lose any of them, and to my surprise 6 fry of three different sizes, must have been three different spawns, or at least two spawns. Back inside the house they reside in a 55 gallon tank in my laundry room just off of the floor since they like cooler water temps. There is a mix of sand and gravel substrate, rocks for hiding, floating plants, and sponge filters. I know the book said to put them in a species tank but I have too many fish, they just had to put up with some other tank mates, there are cherry barbs, some small danios, and some Scleromastyx barbatus. They seem to be all getting along, the A. goslinei don't seem to be timid they are always out swimming around. I just keep on watching for a female to start getting a little chunky, they don't blimp out like some of the other goodeids do, as soon as I see one she will go into a 10 gallon breeder trap tank, to see if I can get some more fry successfully that way. The waiting is the hardest part

The Ultimate "Little Gray Ditch Fish" Phalloptychus januarius

There has been a joke amongst live-bearer keepers for years that so many of the rare and sought-after species are not really all that appealing to look at compared to what most people think of when dealing with tropical fish, hence the description you see above in the title. OK, so maybe this one is silver rather than gray, but you still get the point. What it does have going for it is rarity. You can be the first on your block to have a chance at killing off a really rare fish (yeah, they're kind of delicate too). It's everything that the true "fish geek" wants!

Seriously, these little guys (and I mean little, maximum size for males is about an inch, females about a half inch larger) hail from the vicinity of Rio de Janero in Brazil and adjacent parts of Bolivia & Paraguay making them some of the most Southerly poeciliid livebearers. This is also where they get their species name as Rio de Janero translates from Portugese as "January River." The genus name refers to the bent gonopodiums of the males and this trait is the main thing that separates this genus from close relatives Cnestrodon and Phalloceros.

You might at this point wonder how and why did I end up with this fish? Well it all boils down to the fact that the American Livebearer Convention will be hosted by The Greater Akron Aquarium Society this Spring. Every year some rare fish are either donated by or purchased from labs that are studying them. And that is where these guys came from. The good or bad news, depending on how you look at it was they were shipped well in advance (like about 8 months!) of the event and needed to be housed somewhere. Just so happened I

had some empty tank space and I'm always up for trying something new. (Yeah, I know I'm a BAP slut!)

So, armed with the information they're rare, delicate and they like some salt in their water, I was given a bag of roughly a dozen little silver fish of various sizes and ages and told "go for it" and to bring back what I had to the convention next April. Well almost immediately the adults started to drop one or two a week and I began to think "here we go, I'm going to kill off the rarest fish in the world and everyone will think my fishroom has turned into a black hole of doom!" Thankfully, a few weeks into it I noticed a few fry darting around the leaves of a floating piece of Anubius so I just kept up maintenance I had been doing which consisted of small feedings of crushed flake food, frozen adult brine shrimp and live baby brine shrimp alternated once or twice a day, that combined with a 30% weekly water change and the addition of a tablespoon of Instant Ocean salt to a ten gallon tank. By New Years all of the original adults were gone but the juveniles had grown up and were producing fry regularly. You never saw a

lot at a time, 2 to 4 new little guys would turn up every couple of weeks, but they were steadily increasing in numbers. I can see where they got the common name of "Barred Millionsfish" because like guppies, they are prolific when there is a colony of them and they are definitely into togetherness.

Then as luck would have it, I talked to some of the other aquarists that this group of fish had been distributed to and found out that most everyone else had similar results to mine with the adult fish dropping off. Only time will tell if that was caused by this species not being long lived or if is one of those fish that doesn't take well to being moved to different conditions.

When all is said and done, I feel I've done my part. I'll be bringing more individuals to the convention than I started with, and on top of that by writing this article I even get my BAP points for a fish that I don't really "own". I couldn't ask for anything better!
