

THE GREATER AKRON AQUARIUM SOCIETY

WHO ARE WE? We are a local group of aquatic enthusiasts. Formed in 1952, the Greater Akron Aquarium Society is a non-profit, non-commercial organization. Our membership ranges from the beginning hobbyist to the advanced aquarist with many years of experience. The goals of our club are to promote the care, study, breeding and exhibition of aquarium related aquatic life and to promote interest in the aquarium hobby.

MEETINGS: Our meetings are held on the first Thursday of each month at 8:00 p.m. at the Mogadore Community/Senior Center, 3857 Mogadore Road, Mogadore, Ohio. It is located East of Route 532 across from McDonald's in the former post office building. Visitors are always welcome, it costs absolutely nothing to attend a meeting and look us over.

MEMBERSHIP: The cost is only \$7.50 for adults, \$10 for a couple or a family (includes children under 10 years of age) and \$5.00 for a junior membership (10 to 17 years) Membership provides an opportunity to socialize with other that share your interests, a subscription to our bi-monthly magazine, library usage and more.

AGENDA: Our meeting agenda is simple and informal. The meeting will begin at 8:00 p.m. with a short business meeting. Immediately following is the program for the evening which usually lasts about 45 minutes. Our programs consist of a speaker, slide program, movie or perhaps a panel discussion always on a particular subject related to the hobby or various species of fish. Following the program is a short refreshment break. After which the winners of the Bowl Show are announced, the Breeder's Award Program fish are auctioned and tickets are drawn for the equipment and book raffles.

THE BOWL SHOW: Each month members can bring in fish for specific classes to compete for first, second and third place awards. The charge for each entry is only \$.25. Members also compete for annual awards by accumulating wins throughout the year.

BREEDER'S AWARD and HORTICULTURE AWARD PROGRAMS: members can receive recognition for spawning species of fish or propagating aquatic plants. All that is required is to turn in a minimum of six fry from the spawn that are between 30 and 90 days old. Members earn certificates for each species and can work towards plaques in different categories.

LIBRARY: At the library table are a number of books and other publications covering all areas of the aquarium hobby. Members may borrow the books for a month at a time. Also each month several books are raffled off.

EQUIPMENT RAFFLE: The raffle table has such items as tanks, fish food and aquarium accessories that are donated by national manufacturers, area dealers or purchased by the Society. Tickets may be purchased by anyone attending the meeting. Save your losing tickets for the Christmas Party raffle.

ANNUAL SHOW: The Ultra-Aqua show is held during the summer at the Tallmadge community Center. This has become one of the largest all-species tropical fish shows in North America. It is an international gathering of hobbyists to display their fish in class competition, talk fish and to learn about the hobby from each other.

TANK TOPICS: is published on a bi-monthly basis for the members of the Greater Akron Aquarium Society. Articles and comments for this publication are welcome and encouraged. Such articles are to be submitted no later than the board meeting prior to publication. All articles may be reprinted as long as the author(s) and GAAS are given proper credit and two copies of the publication containing the reprint are sent to GAAS. President's Message



AN INSIDER'S VIEW OF THE 2011 ALA CONVENTION

Set-up

You can call this shameless promoting or the ramblings of a proud father but I am offering you a different perspective with this article. Call this letting people see how a play looks from the viewpoint of the stage crew. Putting on an event like a convention can drive apart friendships or build bonds. For whatever reason things like an annual show or occasional convention really revs things up. Our team was so good this weekend that awesome is the only way to describe them. My first hour on writing this was consumed with naming the players and what part they played. Before long it looked like a new play on "Who's on First?" Does who did what make a difference? I do not know. Should I list everyone? Well, I hope I did but my apologies if I did not. Why write this? It is good to let people know what has to happen on an ALA convention weekend.

The first thing that usually happens is sending the attendees off on their side trips. They need to be accounted for, given tickets (or something) then sent on their way - not a big job but a polite thing to do for your visitors. Then the room layouts should be checked. Trust me you do not want to check the layouts AFTER the first vendor has already setup.

One of the next items is the hospitality room preparation. The people handling that go to the local grocery store and buy a bunch of trays or they can go the extra mile and make their own trays. I just write the check and leave it to them. Our folks always do a great job.

Another front end activity is bringing the

show trailer but of course there was a hitch. Doesn't there always have to be a hitch? The diesel truck went down and a lighter duty pickup was hard pressed to handle around 3 tons of wood and equipment so there was a change of plan. They dug through the stuff trying to find enough to put up a 150 entry show. We brought in the parts and laid out the racks. After putting together one rack, the guys got the drift and soon the rest were being assembled. If I remember correctly even one of the ALAers (Ron Finlayson) joined in the set up. There was a slew of folks bringing in the racks and putting them up. Heck, I think that I even saw Darrel, Darrel and Larry (according to "Hammer" this would be use of my North Coast humor). The point being that the racks were up and the black cloth coverings were draped. Excess wood was taken back to the trailer and the air system, rack skirts, red cloth and water containers needed to be picked up so off they went.

In the mean time a blur of others were setting up the convention registration tables. I say blur because they had to be getting help. Boxes and boxes of stuff had filled up Wayne's van and my car.

All of that had to be unloaded and placed where needed. There were free stuff to be brought out (like magazines), T shirts to be folded and arranged by size, donations set to the side and the computers needed set up. Attendee envelopes were being stuffed with Koozie, lanyards, pens, schedules and welcome letters. All the boxes were opened and checked to make sure we had everything that was needed. Computers were fired up. Dona-

Convention doors opened at 6 PM and plenty was to be done.

In the meantime the computer and projector needed set-up in the speaker room. Of course there was the vendor room/sales table room. The vendors were used to the drill they found their space and went to work. Although I was sure that we pulled no punches with describing the whys and wherefores of the convention. We had a whole lot vying for spots and asking for extra tables. And this was Friday and the Sales room was not set to open until Saturday. That would be like trying to stop a boulder from rolling down hill. So people were up and selling on Friday.

Needless to say the doors were opened and convention begun. Show racks were not quite ready yet but it was onward and upward.

Once the first talk started the registration/show room became a ghost town. The only people left in the show registration area were the workers.

It was a good thing since the guys were back with the missed items. Over the phone we were using charades and anything else we could think of in an effort to ensure that everything we needed made it to the show site and it did. Folks finished off the skirting, set up the air and filled the holding containers for the water. The surprising part is that these guys (rack delivery crew) were on their first fish show. Shiny! It was not that late on Friday and the show was ready to go.

Oops! There was one more thing, because there always has to be one more thing. We could not find the show registration forms. As it turned out Bill Kohler was there when I was told and Bill volunteered to whip up a form if I sketched one. I put pen to paper then off went Bill to the internet café and business center. Before I knew it another day had slipped




