THE GREATER AKRON AQUARIUM SOCIETY

WHO ARE WE? We are a local group of aquatic enthusiasts. Formed in 1952, the Greater Akron Aquarium Society is a non-profit, non-commercial organization. Our membership ranges from the beginning hobbyist to the advanced aquarist with many years of experience. The goals of our club are to promote the care, study, breeding and exhibition of aquarium related aquatic life and to promote interest in the aquarium hobby.

MEETINGS: Our meetings are held on the first Thursday of each month at 8:00 p.m. at the Mogadore Community/Senior Center, 3857 Mogadore Road, Mogadore, Ohio. It is located East of Route 532 across from McDonald's in the former post office building. Visitors are always welcome, it costs absolutely nothing to attend a meeting and look us over.

MEMBERSHIP: The cost is only \$7.50 for adults, \$10 for a couple or a family (includes children under 10 years of age) and \$5.00 for a junior membership (10 to 17 years) Membership provides an opportunity to socialize with other that share your interests, a subscription to our bi-monthly magazine, library usage and more.

AGENDA: Our meeting agenda is simple and informal. The meeting will begin at 8:00 p.m. with a short business meeting. Immediately following is the program for the evening which usually lasts about 45 minutes. Our programs consist of a speaker, slide program, movie or perhaps a panel discussion always on a particular subject related to the hobby or various species of fish. Following the program is a short refreshment break. After which the winners of the Bowl Show are announced, the Breeder's Award Program fish are auctioned and tickets are drawn for the equipment and book raffles.

THE BOWL SHOW: Each month members can bring in fish for specific classes to compete for first, second and third place awards. The charge for each entry is only \$.25. Members also compete for annual awards by accumulating wins throughout the year.

BREEDER'S AWARD and HORTICULTURE AWARD PROGRAMS: members can receive recognition for spawning species of fish or propagating aquatic plants. All that is required is to turn in a minimum of six fry from the spawn that are between 30 and 90 days old. Members earn certificates for each species and can work towards plaques in different categories.

LIBRARY: At the library table are a number of books and other publications covering all areas of the aquarium hobby. Members may borrow the books for a month at a time. Also each month several books are raffled off.

EQUIPMENT RAFFLE: The raffle table has such items as tanks, fish food and aquarium accessories that are donated by national manufacturers, area dealers or purchased by the Society. Tickets may be purchased by anyone attending the meeting. Save your losing tickets for the Christmas Party raffle.

ANNUAL SHOW: The Ultra-Aqua show is held during the summer at the Tallmadge community Center. This has become one of the largest all-species tropical fish shows in North America. It is an international gathering of hobbyists to display their fish in class competition, talk fish and to learn about the hobby from each other.

TANK TOPICS: is published on a bi-monthly basis for the members of the Greater Akron Aquarium Society. Articles and comments for this publication are welcome and encouraged. Such articles are to be submitted no later than the board meeting prior to publication. All articles may be reprinted as long as the author(s) and GAAS are given proper credit and two copies of the publication containing the reprint are sent to GAAS. 


BAP/HAP Report

Seems like I just did this, but here we go with the start of the new BAP/HAP year.

Hope everyone had a good Thanks-giving, as this is the start of the holiday season also. We had our annual club Christmas party/December meeting on the 1st. There was lots of good food, a big raffle, and the member appreciation giveaway, this year we had fish of course, plants, driftwood,





and fish food; everyone should have gotten something they can enjoy or use in their fish rooms. I know I did. This comes as no surprise to me, there were no spawns turned in at the meeting, this is usually the way it is, since we give fish away no one wants to buy fish in the BAP/HAP auction. I did receive a picture and paperwork for one plant flowering, so the Horticultural Award Program is off and running.

To stimulate the Breeder Award Program, I will be giving a coupon for one dollars worth of raffle tickets for each spawn submitted by a member for the next year, let's see if that helps any. Just to remind everyone, to get credit for a spawn a couple of things can be done, the most commonly used method is to turn in a minimum of 6 fry between 30 – 90 days old either at a monthly meeting or at one of our auctions. The second method is to have a spawn verified by a board member that the breeder kept them alive for the 30 - 90 days, write an article telling what the fish are, where they come from, how you kept them, what you fed them, how they spawned, and how you kept the fry alive. Believe me writing an article is not that hard and of course our editor would appreciate getting something to put in our Tank Topics.

Now I come to the Horticultural Award Program, the main item I am bringing up is something that we have been to lenient on for the past few years, to be given credit for a vegetative propagation of a plant in classes C & D a written report needs to be turned in. This does not have to be an extensive article, although you can write one if you want again our editor would be happy. Just a simple report; what the plant is, species name and common name, where it comes from, how it grows, conditions under which you grew it, if you used fertilizer, CO2, what kind of lighting was used, grown submersed, emersed, or floating, in an aquarium, outdoors, if it flowered (class E) more points, or whatever you want to share about it. A report also has to be written for class F – sexual reproduction, the plant needs to be verified that it flowered and went to seed, and seeds sprouted and grew into plants that are recognizable as the same kind of plant as the parent plant; pictures are a good way to document the entire process. The pictures are also good to illustrate the report, and good filler for our publication. If anyone needs a copy of the rules and forms for either of the programs they can all be downloaded from our club web site, or you can get a copies from me at the meeting. Again we need to follow these simple rules of the programs, this year let's do it right!



Just a review of the annual competition rules this month:



4 points for each 1st place entry

2 points for each 2nd place entry

1 point for each 3rd place entry

1 point for each entry (maximum of 5 points per class, in addition to points for placing entries)

If a class of fish has been shown previously in that bowl show year, it is not eligible for judging in any "all other" species bowl show (example: If there is a bowl show for guppies, guppies can not be entered in the "all other" livebearer species bowl shows.) The Special Activities chairperson should point out deformed or diseased fish to the participants.

Poeciliopsis viriosa

The fish genus Poeciliopsis is widely distributed from Arizona to northern Colombia. There are 20 named species with half distributed near the geologically active Trans-Mexican Volcanic Belt. This geologic feature marks the southern limit of the Mexican central plateau. This genus is assigned to the tribe Heterandriini, supertribe Poeciliini, subfamily Poeciliinae so it is a Poeciliid that is more closely related to the Heterandria genus than the Poecilia or Xiphophorus genera. Like Heterandria formosa, many Poeciliopsis are superfoetaters, a reproduction trait that allows females to carry multiple broods of young at a time. Unlike Heterandria formosa that can carry up to nine broods of young, the Poeciliopsis



sp can carry only two or three broods at one time.

Poeciliopsis viriosa comes from the Gulf of California in the Mexican state of Sinaloa down to the Pacific coast of the state of Nayarit, almost to Jalisco. I decided to search NEODAT II for listing of Museum Records of collected specimens.

the following places: Rio, 8 mi NNW of Rosario, on Nat. Rt. 15, Sinaloa; Rio Panuco, Chele, Sinaloa; Stream 26 mi SE of Culiacan, Sinaloa; Small stream 8 mi NW of Elota, Sinaloa; Rio San Lorenzo at Quila, Sinaloa; Junction of Rio Culiacan and Bladat Creek, near Imala, Sinaloa; Arroyo Huajote, Sinaloa; Rio Chila, Nayarit; trib Rio Grande de Santiago, Nayarit; Rio San Miguel, Nayarit; trib. to Rio Santiago, Nayarit; Rio Acaponeta, Nayarit; trib. of Rio Ameca, Navarit ; Arroyo San Francisco just SE of San Francisco, Nayarit; Rio Sauta just S of Mexico Hwy., Nayarit; trib. Rio

Ameca, Jalisco; Spring-fed creek ca. 4.5 mi SW of Las Palmas on road to Ixtapita, Jalisco. A general map of the area is in Figure 1.

Description of the species

Poeciliosis viriosa looks similar to other Poeciliopsis species. The males are around 1.5-inches long with an elongated body and a pointed head. Females can reach up to 2.5-inches in length. Males display a brassy body color with black coloration in the ventral region behind the gonopodium. (Figures 2 & 3)

<u>Habitat</u>

According to Wischnath, this fish can be found in a variety of freshwater habitats in the Pacific coastal regions of the Mexican states of Sinaloa, Nayarit and Jalisco.

Personal observations

I had picked up some fry from Bob Cashin at the end of last summer. I placed the fish in a 15-gallon bare bottom tank containing a sponge filter, Java moss and Riccia. The fish were fed a variety of foods - live daphnia, baby brine shrimp, frozen brine shrimp and flake foods.

Since the tank was filled with plants and the fish grew slowly, they were mainly ignored. I was able to grow up fry in the same tanks of the parents but the adults seemed fond of chasing babies. The fish were quite sensitive to water quality slacking off on water changes was not tolerated.
