THE GREATER AKRON AQUARIUM SOCIETY

WHO ARE WE? We are a local group of aquatic enthusiasts. Formed in 1952, the Greater Akron Aquarium Society is a non-profit, non-commercial organization. Our membership ranges from the beginning hobbyist to the advanced aquarist with many years of experience. The goals of our club are to promote the care, study, breeding and exhibition of aquarium related aquatic life and to promote interest in the aquarium hobby.

MEETINGS: Our meetings are held on the first Thursday of each month at 8:00 p.m. at the Mogadore Community/Senior Center, 3857 Mogadore Road, Mogadore, Ohio. It is located East of Route 532 across from McDonald's in the former post office building. Visitors are always welcome, it costs absolutely nothing to attend a meeting and look us over.

MEMBERSHIP: The cost is only \$10 for adults, a couple or a family (includes children under 10 years of age) and \$5.00 for a junior membership (10 to 17 years) Membership provides an opportunity to socialize with others that share your interests, a subscription to our bi-monthly magazine and more.

AGENDA: Our meeting agenda is simple and informal. The meeting will begin at 8:00 p.m. with a short business meeting. Immediately following is the program for the evening which usually lasts about 45 minutes. Our programs consist of a speaker, slide program, movie or perhaps a panel discussion always on a particular subject related to the hobby or various species of fish. Following the program is a short refreshment break. After which the winners of the Bowl Show are announced, the Breeder's Award Program fish are auctioned and tickets are drawn for the raffle.

THE BOWL SHOW: Each month members can bring in fish for specific classes to compete for first, second and third place awards. The charge for each entry is only \$.25. Members also compete for annual awards by accumulating wins throughout the year.

BREEDER'S AWARD and HORTICULTURE AWARD PROGRAMS: members can receive recognition for spawning species of fish or propagating aquatic plants. All that is required is to turn in a minimum of six fry from the spawn that are between 30 and 90 days old. Members earn certificates for each species and can work towards plaques in different categories.

EQUIPMENT RAFFLE: The raffle table has such items as tanks, fish food and aquarium accessories that are donated by national manufacturers, area dealers or purchased by the Society. Tickets may be purchased by anyone attending the meeting. Save your losing tickets for the Christmas Party raffle.

ANNUAL SHOW: The Ultra-Aqua show is held during the summer at the Tallmadge community Center. This has become one of the largest all-species tropical fish shows in North America. It is an international gathering of hobbyists to display their fish in class competition, talk fish and to learn about the hobby from each other.

TANK TOPICS: is published on a bi-monthly basis for the members of the Greater Akron Aquarium Society. Articles and comments for this publication are welcome and encouraged. Such articles are to be submitted no later than the board meeting prior to publication. The Mystery of the Crypt – Cryptocoryne usteriana

Over the past too many years I have tried to keep several different species of Cryptocorynes, they sort of just survive but do not flourish as they should. I figured out part of the problem could be that all of my well water goes through a Kinetico water softener, which removes the minerals and odors (rotten egg smell) that often accompany well water, but it replaces them with sodium ions (salt). This might also explain why I can't keep certain species of fish, mainly angels and guppies, but also why I can't get Java moss to grow in my tanks, I have friends that can grow it by the tank full, but at my house it just sits there and eventually turns to brown then to mush which I have to siphon out. It will grow in a terrarium for me, that is out of the

water, in a dirt substrate, and in an enclosed tank to keep the humidity up, other plants that grow well that way are Cryptocorynes, and Anubias, these plants also grow faster and larger than they do in submersed conditions.

At the present time I have a few different species of Cryptocorynes in a variety of aquarium setups, to see which way has the best results. I have a few in a couple of home made 50 gallon breeders that we got many years ago from a guy that had them custom made for the pet shop he ran in Garrettsville, they are 48" long x 20" wide x 12" tall, the perfect size tank for a lot of fish that don't like or need deep water, like livebearers. We got these for \$15 each (a real steal) I am currently run-

ning nine of them, almost all housing livebearers. Then I have a couple crypts in a 29 gallon, with you guessed it, livebearers and a couple of rainbow fish, and a couple in a 120 gallon also from a shop that went out of business, again with not only livebearers, but also cichlids, rainbows, and a couple of barbs. All are unheated so the growing conditions only vary in water depth and lighting, the two breeders are uncovered so the light does not get filtered; the 29 and 120 both have glass tops, all have fluorescent lighting, I haven't upgraded to led lighting yet. The two pots sort of containing the Cryptocoryne usteriana that are actually flourishing are in one of the 50 breeders, they both have lots of rhizome runners escaping over the rims of their pots. The crypts in the other 50 breeder are different species; one C. ciliata, one C. affinis, and one C. cordata which did flower for me. none of them are doing as well as the C. usteriana even though the conditions are identical, and I do use Flourish the liquid plant fertilizer regularly. This is the mystery of the Crypts, I guess the C. usteriana is growing so much better than the oth-

ers is that it is just better suited to the conditions that I have in my fish room. All of my crypts are planted in 4 inch pots, because I use a thin layer of sand as a substrate in almost all of my tanks, originally I used a mixture of top soil and sand, but have since changed it to a mixture of fine gravel, sand and some laterite mixed in.

C. usteriana is endemic to the Philippines, they were first collected near Buenavista by A. Usteri, but that location no longer exists. It was rediscovered in 1983 by J. Bogner in the Bigo River near the town of Concepcion on the island

of Guimaras growing in shady areas of shallow water with a Ph of around 6, in a gravelly - sandy substrate. For many years it was thought that C. aponogetofolia and C. usteriana were both, the same species, due to their size and appearance. However after further research by Bogner in 1984 in their natural habitat, it was determined that they were in fact two different species, C. aponogetofolia has leaves that are green on top and lighter green on the underside, whereas C. usteriana has leaves that are green to green - brown on top and a pale to deep reddish - purple underneath.

The C. usteriana is a rosette plant that grows from a rhizome/root; the



leaves grow from a central point on petioles (stems) of varying lengths, the leaves can grow up to almost 18 inches long and almost 2 inches wide, they have a lanceolate shape (ribbon like) coming to a point. The leaf has a strong mid rib; on both sides the surface can have 2 – 3 rows of prominent bumps or blisters (which are known as bulate) with a wavy (undulate) margin.

The inflorescence in the submersed form is adapted to the depth of the water, the spathe or tube is colored a dirty flesh – red and up to around 4 inches tall, the opening known as the throat is smooth and bright yellow, there is a slightly twisted limb above the throat. I have never seen this as I

have never noticed either one of mine flower

The species grows well in soft to hard water, under medium intensity lighting, in a loose nutrient rich medium, and at room temperatures, should be the perfect plant for me. Propagation is by rhizome runners, after being established for a while the plant will have runners start growing from the main rhizome/root on which new plants will start growing, the runner I cut off to turn in for the Horticultural Award Program had one good sized plant with roots and then split and had two small plants growing with the runner continuing on growing. However the species does not stand transplanting very well, it will need some time before it

starts growing again, I don't know if it will do the typical crypt melt, caused by changing water parameters, or temperature changes. If I can grow this crypt anyone that has water and light should be able to also.
