### THE GREATER AKRON AQUARIUM SOCIETY

**WHO ARE WE?** We are a local group of aquatic enthusiasts. Formed in 1952, the Greater Akron Aquarium Society is a non-profit, non-commercial organization. Our membership ranges from the beginning hobbyist to the advanced aquarist with many years of experience. The goals of our club are to promote the care, study, breeding and exhibition of aquarium related aquatic life and to promote interest in the aquarium hobby.

**MEETINGS:** Our meetings are held on the first Thursday of each month at 8:00 p.m. at the Mogadore Community/Senior Center, 3857 Mogadore Road, Mogadore, Ohio. It is located East of Route 532 across from McDonald's in the former post office building. Visitors are always welcome, it costs absolutely nothing to attend a meeting and look us over.

**MEMBERSHIP:** The cost is only \$10 for adults, a couple or a family (includes children under 10 years of age) and \$5.00 for a junior membership (10 to 17 years) Membership provides an opportunity to socialize with others that share your interests, a subscription to our bi-monthly magazine and more.

**AGENDA:** Our meeting agenda is simple and informal. The meeting will begin at 8:00 p.m. with a short business meeting. Immediately following is the program for the evening which usually lasts about 45 minutes. Our programs consist of a speaker, slide program, movie or perhaps a panel discussion always on a particular subject related to the hobby or various species of fish. Following the program is a short refreshment break. After which the winners of the Bowl Show are announced, the Breeder's Award Program fish are auctioned and tickets are drawn for the raffle.

**THE BOWL SHOW:** Each month members can bring in fish for specific classes to compete for first, second and third place awards. The charge for each entry is only \$.25. Members also compete for annual awards by accumulating wins throughout the year.

**BREEDER'S AWARD and HORTICULTURE AWARD PROGRAMS:** members can receive recognition for spawning species of fish or propagating aquatic plants. All that is required is to turn in a minimum of six fry from the spawn that are between 30 and 90 days old. Members earn certificates for each species and can work towards plaques in different categories.

**EQUIPMENT RAFFLE:** The raffle table has such items as tanks, fish food and aquarium accessories that are donated by national manufacturers, area dealers or purchased by the Society. Tickets may be purchased by anyone attending the meeting. Save your losing tickets for the Christmas Party raffle.

**ANNUAL SHOW:** The Ultra-Aqua show is held during the summer at the Tallmadge community Center. This has become one of the largest all-species tropical fish shows in North America. It is an international gathering of hobbyists to display their fish in class competition, talk fish and to learn about the hobby from each other.

**TANK TOPICS:** is published on a bi-monthly basis for the members of the Greater Akron Aquarium Society. Articles and comments for this publication are welcome and encouraged. Such articles are to be submitted no later than the board meeting prior to publication. All articles may be reprinted as long as the author(s) and GAAS are given proper credit and two copies of the publication containing the reprint are sent to GAAS. ### **BAP/HAP** Report



Summer is half over already, Mother Nature is just baking the days away one after another, the water just keeps evaporating from my 110 gallon outdoor tubs, I have topped them off twice so far this summer. The water lilies are blooming like crazy, and I have fish in all 15 of the tubs, there have been spawns in seven of them so far, five with fry and two with rainbowfish eggs, but should be fry soon. The one real surprise was the green terror juveniles I picked up at our show auction; they were just 11/2" then, now around 3", and the large group of fry they produced. Other fish I have outside are three species of danios, livebearers almost all goodeids, five species of rainbows, three species of tetras, two species of cichlids and two species of loaches, I figured I would try them outside as I have both sexes of each species and they weren't spawning indoors. With putting all those fish outside I actually had a couple of empty tanks in the fish room, but have started moving things around and filled them rather quickly.

We just had our club's membership appreciation / summer picnic / monthly meeting on August 4th, lots of good food, a fish and live plant giveaway, an interesting talk on photography, and the dry goods raffle. So there were some good fish given away for members to take home to work with, so hopefully there will be some spawns taking place in the near future. The summer is a slow time for fish club auctions, but they will be starting back up in September and running through November with our fall auction on Sunday November 6th, and finishing with the Ohio Cichlid Association Extravaganza happening November 18th -20th.

A couple of months ago I had a short rant about our Horticultural Award Program, as of then there was only one submission, and since it was from me I said we might not have a Horticulturalist of the Year because I didn't think I deserved an award for one item. I guess I got my point across; things picked up for the last two months, now there are five members in the running with14 propagations and flowerings, lets keep it going though. We only had 4 spawns turned in at the July meeting but we had 9 spawns turned in at the August meeting, that's a step in the right direction. We are only 10 spawns away from eclipsing last years total and it's only August there are still 3 more months for the BAP / HAP year to determine the Breeder of the Year and Horticulturist of the Year, and it's is not a runaway by any member so keep spawning and propagatina.



John would cut employees a good deal if he didn't have to fork out cold cash. I don't want to indicate that John was cheap, but he really liked to stretch a buck. I told him one time that a fluorescent light over a tank wouldn't start. So he shows me how you reach into the tank and rub a handful of water on the bulb and sometimes they fire right up. I was scared speechless by that one.

Once, I was fortunate enough to be there to experience closing time on the last open day before New years. The celebration consisted of all present getting a generous shot of some hard liquor and drinking a toast. I was never much of a drinker and being a teenager at the time this was pretty exciting.

John taught me about ordering double cheeseburgers from McD's because at the time it wasn't actually on the menu, but they'd make you one if you asked and it was always hot! He also got me addicted to hot fudge malts at DQ. Something I still get when I go there.

I'll always remember John as a kind man. As I got older, I was always amazed that he managed to treat people as nicely as he did and still make a buck running a fish store.

#### **Nicole Smyers**

Well, I'm not really sure where to start... I never really thought I'd be writing a memoriam story for John. And even though months have past, I am still in shock by his passing. John meant a lot to me, and he was definitely a key member in shaping my future. So when I heard about the opportunity to share a story for the newsletter; I was all over that. Except that there were so many! It was difficult to pick the best one. So I'll stop rambling and get to my most memorable moment with John.

Of course, it was at Wet Pets Plus! I had been working there for guite some time. It was closing time and myself, Chris, and Christine were finishing up cleaning tanks and feeding critters. John was doing his closing duties and I believe Stan and Dave were there too; but I could be wrong. I was topping off the back African Cichlid row; and after I finished that I had went onto a different task. Moments later! Chris ran up front to grab the fire extinguisher and rushed back to the Cichlid row I had just topped off. Of course I followed! And came to find out that one of my tanks were bubbling over the edge and right on top of an electrical outlet. Yes, the fire extinguisher was needed; and yes, my heart had just dropped into my stomach. I just about set the store on fire. I mean, there was a fire... that electrical outlet was completely touched. Definitely the biggest 'oops' of my life!

Now John was always a quiet man.

I've never seen him angry or anything! He was always so low key. But not that night; that night I heard every curse word in the dictionary and for the first time saw John so SO angry! I was beyond upset with myself. I hate making mistakes, let alone setting the store on fire level of mistake. So I was a nervous wreck. I stayed very late cleaning up my natural disaster. I also didn't want to leave that night knowing John was upset with me. So after some time for cool down, I approached John. I apologized over and over again, and I explained how I knew where I went wrong. After nervously blabbering on and on for about one minute, John stopped me. He assured me that while he is upset, he did not hate me and still thought I was a good employee. We all make mistakes... just not setting the store on fire type of mistakes! But I'll tell you what, I learned really quick from that mistake and it never happened again. That was also when I earned the nickname "Sparky". But that;s another story, the one I want to tell is the time he asked me to design and build a complete fish tank rack addition to his newly expanded store on route 532. After talking to him about what he needed and was looking for, I measured off the area and came with and presented the floor plan. After looking at it, he says this is just what he was looking for, so we ordered the materials and I started building the rack, then the fun began. John made 6 changes to the design. This made it take 3 times as long to get done, each time I had to disassemble and reassemble what I had just put together the day before. And to make things even better was that another member at the time, Ken Galaska, who was an electrician, was installing the wiring and lights for the racks, had to do the same thing, disassemble and reassemble the lights and wiring to fit the changes in the rack design. Good thing we both liked John, when we finally got the racks and lights done, it looked nothing like the design I presented at first. I did tell John that he was a nice guy and all, but if I was to do anything for him like that again, he was going to ok the plans, then go away on vacation till I got it done!!

I met John when Joanne started working at Wet Pets Plus in Mogadore, he just seemed like a laid back nice guy, the kind of person I think I would have enjoyed working for, but I had my factory job. Any time I went to the pet shop he was pleasant and we talked about what kind of fish I was keeping, he wasn't always at the shop though then I had to put up with employees like Joanne. After a while the shop moved down to Canton in a plaza off of Whipple Ave., a longer drive but worth the time. I didn't help with that move, but when the shop moved again to the last location on Whipple Ave., I helped in tearing down the racks at the old location. By the time the shop was up and running again, if I stopped in and John was there he would tell me to go catch my fish and someone would bag them up for me. That is a little easier than trying to point out a certain fish in a tank with other fish to someone else. After many years there was rumors that John was going to close the shop, I waited until Dave informed me that it was official. I was there the next morning and bought three of the display tanks one 100 gallon, two 120 gallon, and two 30 gallon breeders that they used for plants. John gave me a good deal on the lot, so every time I go into my fish room I am reminded of John and Wet Pets Plus.

The first time I met John was back in the 60s. It had to be since my dad drove me to a "Spartans" store which was on Steels Corner. I had gotten to take over the 20 gallon tank in the dinning room (my brother went off to college) and I was going to choose some fish to put in it. This young guy took his time with me even though I probably did not spend any more than \$10 in total. Quite frankly I would have probably would have not remembered the guy (just the experience) if it was not that I ran into him a few years later when I went into the old Dotties' Wet Pets which was the beginning of his run at owning Wet Pets.

Until I actually gotten involved in the organized hobby in the 1980's, John's store which always seemed to have more than just the 'bread & butter' of the hobby kept me excited about the hobby. John was always good for 'a fish chat' when he was at the store. John was friend with a college professor of mine (Walt) and kept us in contact.

Wet Pets/John was the staple of my pet store experiences for many years. If I would not have had such good experiences, I may have never gotten so involved with the hobby.

He gave me my first job at Wet Pets. I was far too young but John gave a me a shot. I remember him as a kind, funny man who made me feel happy to work for. That job had a big impact on me and I'll be forever grateful to him for that.

When we came up with doing this article, I started thinking back when I actually met John, he was the GAAS club treasurer at the time and it was April of 1981. It was just a simple introduction, "Hi, nice to meet you" but little did I know the impact it would make on my life. Back then I was in college and on Fridays if I didn't have any classes, I would come down to Akron and end up hanging out at Wet Pets. I became a regular and got "dipping and bagging privileges" (could catch my own fish, great for picking out pairs and potential show fish). One day while doing just that I was bemoaning the fact that I was a "broke college student" and there were more things I liked than I could afford. John's answer to that was to put me to work tearing down and moving a 70 gallon tank. I wished right then that I could guit my Kmart nightmare and work there, but the logistics of living in Aurora, going to school in Parma and working in Mogadore just wouldn't work out. Fast forward roughly four years, I had gotten a "real job" and bought a house in Cuyahoga Falls. I was dying to host a GAAS board meeting and did so just weeks after moving in to the new house. That night, Scott Simon, (who at the time was one of the few full time workers at Wet Pets) approached me after the meeting and said that since I was now in the area. John wanted to know if I would like to come out and work part-time. Of course I was out there the next day after work to say yes and started the day after that! So then for the next few years I worked full time at a

print shop and part time at Wet Pets and I kept thinking I would rather be doing the pet trade thing for the full time. John knew better and tried to drill it into my thick head that I would be further ahead with the status quo. Well, I went with what I thought was a better offer and switched to another store for more hours. It didn't work that well and after a few months I followed a co-worker from that place to another that was even worse and only lasted there three months there. All the while when I'd see John at a meeting or the show, we got along fine, like nothing had happened. It was then that I realized what I had done. Fast forward again a few months, and when John had heard I wasn't working at any store, he asked me to come back again! Then about a year into that, I lost my full time job. For the next six weeks I worked there full time (under the table so it wouldn't interfere with my unemployment, thank you!) Then after hating the new full time job I finally got my wish of doing the pet trade thing full time and spent the next nine years at Wet Pets. Yeah, it

wasn't always perfect, no job ever is. But what was different was that we were given the freedom to use our own experiences and expertise and not have to go by a company "script" for everything. Not too many bosses that I've run across would do that. Even when things had changed so drastically in the pet trade that he saw we weren't going to be able to keep going as we were, I was warned in advance that I should think about looking for something more stable. When do you hear of a manager doing something like that these days? We as a group worked

through floods, eccentric coworkers (you know who you are!), insane customers (Mouse, Peaches & Herb, Big Stinky, etc., etc.) break-ins (and the grand jury testimony to go with it) and for the most part we all stayed sane and friends. Why? Because we had a boss who valued each of us for our individual strengths and abilities. He built a team out of a group of fish geek misfits and high-school biology club dropouts. In my book that takes a little bit of skill to make that work. Yeah, so maybe he was a little bit disorganized (ok, I'm being generous here, he was a lot disorganized) and probably not the best businessman out there, but no one could ever say he didn't care about his customers or his employees. I was, and always will be, proud to have been able to call John Maloney my friend above all else.
