WHO ARE WE? We are a local group of aquatic enthusiasts. Formed in 1952, the Greater Akron Aquarium Society is a non-profit, non-commercial organization. Our membership ranges from the beginning hobbyist to the advanced aquarist with many years of experience. The goals of our club are to promote the care, study, breeding and exhibition of aquarium related aquatic life and to promote interest in the aquarium hobby.

MEETINGS: Our meetings are held on the second Friday of each month at 8:00 p.m. at the Ritchie Memorial Shelter House, 109 West Avenue, Tallmadge, OH 44278. It is located West of Tallmadge Circle with access from Sperry Ave., behind Vet Clinic and across from the Chevrolet dealer. Visitors are always welcome, it costs absolutely nothing to attend a meeting and look us over.

MEMBERSHIP: The cost is only \$10 for adults, a couple or a family (includes children under 10 years of age) and \$5.00 for a junior membership (10 to 17 years) Membership provides an opportunity to socialize with others that share your interests, a subscription to our bi-monthly magazine and more.

AGENDA: Our meeting agenda is simple and informal. The meeting will begin at 8:00 p.m. with a short business meeting. Immediately following is the program for the evening which usually lasts about 45 minutes. Our programs consist of a speaker, slide program, movie or perhaps a panel discussion always on a particular subject related to the hobby or various species of fish. Following the program is a short refreshment break. After which the winners of the Bowl Show are announced, the Breeder's Award Program fish are auctioned and tickets are drawn for the raffle.

THE BOWL SHOW: Each month members can bring in fish for specific classes to compete for first, second and third place awards. The charge for each entry is only \$.25. Members also compete for annual awards by accumulating wins throughout the year.

BREEDER'S AWARD and HORTICULTURE AWARD PROGRAMS: members can receive recognition for spawning species of fish or propagating aquatic plants. All that is required is to turn in a minimum of six fry from the spawn that are between 30 and 90 days old. Members earn certificates for each species and can work towards plaques in different categories.

EQUIPMENT RAFFLE: The raffle table has such items as tanks, fish food and aquarium accessories that are donated by national manufacturers, area dealers or purchased by the Society. Tickets may be purchased by anyone attending the meeting. Save your losing tickets for the Christmas Party raffle.

ANNUAL SHOW: The Ultra-Aqua show is held during the summer at the Tallmadge community Center. This has become one of the largest all-species tropical fish shows in North America. It is an international gathering of hobbyists to display their fish in class competition, talk fish and to learn about the hobby from each other.

TANK TOPICS: is published on a bi-monthly basis for the members of the Greater Akron Aquarium Society. Articles and comments for this publication are welcome and encouraged. Such articles are to be submitted no later than the board meeting prior to publication. All articles may be reprinted as long as the author(s) and GAAS are given proper credit. 

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Those Leupy Leleupi

Over my years of fish keeping I have kept *Neo*lamprologus leleupi several times, usually in a community tank. Their numbers would gradually dwindle down to a single fish, where it would live for a while, but with no others of its kind. One time several years ago a pair did spawn for me in a community tank, one measly little fry survived

the parents and the other fish. I think the main problem was the Synodontis decorus that was also living in the 50 gallon tank. All right enough of this, the next time I got a bag of six juveniles at an auction they were kept in a species tank. Well almost, there were 3 banjo cats that lived in the 1 inch of sand that was used for a substrate, they bury themselves with just their eyes or their mouth exposed, waiting for something to swim close enough to be inhaled. The N. leleupi were too big for the banjo cats to eat, so I left them in the 15 gallon tank with lots of rock caves for the N. leleupi to hide and hopefully spawn in. A Tetra brilliant sponge filter was used for filtration, that's the kind that suction cups to the side of the tank, doesn't take up prime bottom space in the tank. They can be



a single or a double sponge setup; I always use doubles to provide plenty of filtration.

They were first introduced to the hobby in 1958, but were very expensive, in the 1970s they were being commercially breed so the prices came down significantly, and they became much more common in the hobby. N. leleupi like hard alkaline water with a Ph around 8, at temperatures ranging from 74 -79 degrees F. Adults can reach 4 inches in length, and are relatively peaceful. Body shape is cylindrical, males tend to be slightly larger than the females, and when mature, males often develop a slight cranial hump. Coloration varies from a dull looking dark brown almost black to yellow to a beautiful orange, which is commonly known as the firecracker N. leleupi, color variation is probably somewhat dependant on the foods they are eating. The darker colored variety was given a subspecies name of Neolamprologus leleupi longior by Staeck in 1980. If you want you can probably go to the rocky shores of Lake Tanganyika in

Africa to get some, but I opted for the easy way to get the fish, at a fish club auction, much cheaper and no shots. The six juveniles I got were between 1 1/4 - 1 3/8 inches body length, they were a bright yellow in color. Hoping to keep that bright color I fed them Brine shrimp flake and color flake, brine shrimp pellets, and frozen brine shrimp and blood worms. Over the months they grew to between 2 1/2 - 2 3/4 inches, no aggression was ever noticed. but no pairing off either. One morning when I was feeding there was a floater in the tank. the fins and tail were totally shredded, then a few days later there was another one, then another one, and yet another one. Hmmmm, I thought, this could be a good thing, the two remaining ones must have

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paired off, and are getting ready to spawn, sure enough after all the intruders were gone, the two were noticed hanging out in the same cave. I never witnessed nay spawning activity, but one morning during feeding I tawt I taw a puddy tat, no, it was some little clear slivers with black spots at one end, those look like eyes, alright! I got fry. Wooo Hooo!!! Suddenly I remembered the three mouths peeking out of the sand, waiting for some fry to dart by, so they can be consumed, this is not going to turn out well. The cats have to go! At least the banjo cats are easy to catch, you just look for where they are peeking out of the sand and about 2 inches behind that reach into the sand with your fingers and grab them by the body between the belly and the tail. This doesn't always work; if you get too far from the tail they can and will bend their bodies into a "U" shape and them clamp down with their pectoral fins which I learned (the hard way) do have spines and will draw blood. They were then moved too the neighboring tank, before they could eat any or at least any more fry.

N. leleupi are cave spawners, so several sites should be constructed, I used rocks and pieces of slate, that way the pair can choose one that suits them. not too big, not too small, but just right, or close enough anyway. Once the proper site has been chosen the female can lay up to 150 eggs on the roof of the cave, after fertilization the female guards and fans the eggs, which hatch in about three days, while the male defends the territory around the cave. When I first noticed the

fry they were scattered all over the bottom, the parents seemed to not even notice them; they didn't chase them or try to eat them. Good, then I don't have to siphon out the fry. I made sure the adults were well fed, since I fed the fry 3 - 4 times a day, the adults got to eat too, I crushed a small pinch of flake for the fry and left a little flake in bigger pieces to catch the eye of the adults. The fry flit about the bottom like gobies and darters do, waiting for some food to come their way.

I didn't want to disturb the pair by catching them out or by siphoning out the fry. I've been told that with some Neolamprologus species, if most or all of the fry suddenly go missing the adults think each other must have eaten the fry, and then of course one of the pair inevitably winds up dead. I left the fry with the adults, at three month the fry are 1/4 - 3/8 of an inch, everything is still going smoothly. The fry are starting to turn a pale opaque yellow, with three dark spots, the gut and the eyes. I am still thinking about siphoning out some fry to make sure I have enough to turn in for our BAP program, I guess I thought too long, one day I didn't see any fry. The female was in a different cave and the male was swimming around like he usually does. I wondered if they had spawned again, I kept checking and hoping, no new fry but I would occasionally catch sight of one or two fry from the first spawn darting about so a few made it. Then one morning the female was out of the cave, because she was floating dead at the surface totally shredded. I moved the

male to another tank with some Julidochromis and some Australian rainbows: he seems to be getting along just fine. The fry were now seven weeks old and 5/8"- 3/4", they almost seem lost in the 15 gallon tank, because the is a grand total of four, should have siphoned some out, and there will be no next time since the male killed the female. Next time I try N. leleupi I will know what to do, oh well, sometimes you gotta learn the hard way. Well I learned from my mistakes, I tried again this year 2017, again a species only tank, not even any catfish this time. I used a 40 gallon breeder; sand substrate, lots of rocks for caves, and a large Hydrosponge filter, I figured maybe more space might work a little better. I got four adults, nice yellow color, 2 - 2 1/2 inches in size they all seemed to be getting along just fine. I never saw any spawning activity or sparring going on, but I noticed that two of them were staying in one area of the tank; one in a cave guarding eggs or fry (the female) and the other (the male) patrolling the territory around the cave. This time I managed to save 8 fry (success), more than enough to turn in for the Breeder Award Program, now I can move on to some other species.
