WHO ARE WE? We are a local group of aquatic enthusiasts. Formed in 1952, the Greater Akron Aquarium Society is a non-profit, non-commercial organization. Our membership ranges from the beginning hobbyist to the advanced aquarist with many years of experience. The goals of our club are to promote the care, study, breeding and exhibition of aquarium related aquatic life and to promote interest in the aquarium hobby.

MEETINGS: Our meetings are held on the second Friday of each month at 8:00 p.m. at the Ritchie Memorial Shelter House, 109 West Avenue, Tallmadge, OH 44278. It is located West of Tallmadge Circle with access from Sperry Ave., behind Vet Clinic and across from the Chevrolet dealer. Visitors are always welcome, it costs absolutely nothing to attend a meeting and look us over.

MEMBERSHIP: The cost is only \$10 for adults, a couple or a family (includes children under 10 years of age) and \$5.00 for a junior membership (10 to 17 years) Membership provides an opportunity to socialize with others that share your interests, a subscription to our bi-monthly magazine and more.

AGENDA: Our meeting agenda is simple and informal. The meeting will begin at 8:00 p.m. with a short business meeting. Immediately following is the program for the evening which usually lasts about 45 minutes. Our programs consist of a speaker, slide program, movie or perhaps a panel discussion always on a particular subject related to the hobby or various species of fish. Following the program is a short refreshment break. After which the winners of the Bowl Show are announced, the Breeder's Award Program fish are auctioned and tickets are drawn for the raffle.

THE BOWL SHOW: Each month members can bring in fish for specific classes to compete for first, second and third place awards. The charge for each entry is only \$.25. Members also compete for annual awards by accumulating wins throughout the year.

BREEDER'S AWARD and HORTICULTURE AWARD PROGRAMS: members can receive recognition for spawning species of fish or propagating aquatic plants. All that is required is to turn in a minimum of six fry from the spawn that are between 30 and 90 days old. Members earn certificates for each species and can work towards plaques in different categories.

EQUIPMENT RAFFLE: The raffle table has such items as tanks, fish food and aquarium accessories that are donated by national manufacturers, area dealers or purchased by the Society. Tickets may be purchased by anyone attending the meeting. Save your losing tickets for the Christmas Party raffle.

ANNUAL SHOW: The Ultra-Aqua show is held during the summer at the Tallmadge community Center. This has become one of the largest all-species tropical fish shows in North America. It is an international gathering of hobbyists to display their fish in class competition, talk fish and to learn about the hobby from each other.

TANK TOPICS: is published on a bi-monthly basis for the members of the Greater Akron Aquarium Society. Articles and comments for this publication are welcome and encouraged. Such articles are to be submitted no later than the board meeting prior to publication. All articles may be reprinted as long as the author(s) and GAAS are given proper credit. Here we are in the middle of winter, at least according to both of the underground rodents we are going to have 6 more weeks of winter, well it's less than 5 now, come on spring. The first of the 2018 auctions started, OCA was Saturday the 10th, picked up a couple of new things, but didn't stay long so I wouldn't buy a bunch of things I don't need or have room for just because they were in my price range. Our GAAS spring auction (notice it is a SPRING auction) will be here before you know it, Sunday March 4th starting at 11 am, which is command day, as in **"march forth to the spring auction!"** No worries about the time change this year as that happens the next week. So start cleaning up your fish rooms, you know all that stuff you don't use any more that is just sitting around cluttering up the house. If you are selling equipment, make sure it works, clean it up and make it look nice, people will pay more for clean nice looking items than they will for some crusty old aquarium or equipment. 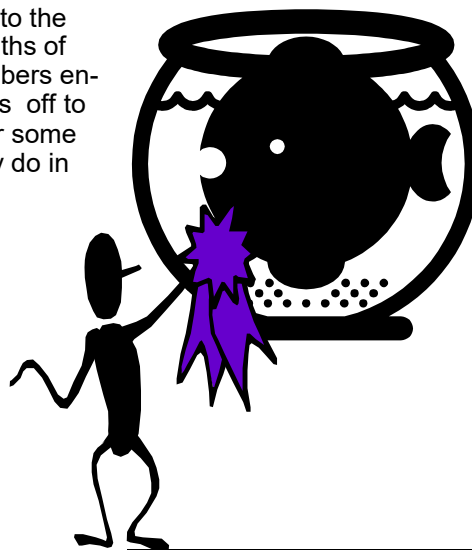



A Classroom Tank Made Easy as 1, 2, 3! (part two)

To provide a quick identification guide of the livestock and plants, I made zoo-style information sheets (composed in PowerPoint) and when printed out showed a picture, the scientific name, and geographic location of each fish, snail, and plant species in the tank. It was my hope that these information sheets might prompt a few students to be curious about the organisms and to do research on their natural history. Ms. M did place these information sheets next to the tank, and I think those sheets added to the experience of the tank.

three pinches of a veggie flake, five shrimp pellets, and two pinches of dried blood worms. I had done my part to get the tank started, and now Ms. M had to do her part to keep the fish fed.

Ms. M did follow the recipe for feeding, and after 6 weeks the fish were still healthy and disease free.

Zoo-style information sheets were hung by the tank to encourage student research.

I provided minimalistic feeding instructions to Ms. M, telling her to feed the tank sparingly in the first week or two to not overload the tanks' biological filter with excessive nitrogen. I prescribed feeding once per day and only three times a week (Monday, Wednesday, and Friday). I also asked her to feed only a teaspoon of food at each feeding. I further prescribed that the teaspoon would contain the following mixture: three pinches of a basic flake food,

I came back to the school in early October to do the first (>25%) water change, and the water quality was by all appearances very clear and in good condition. The *Najas* grass had grown into a dense floating grove with roots hanging down nearly to the tank bottom. The other plants (*Anubias* and Java fern) had not grown noticeably taller in the past month, but they were stable, healthy, and showing signs of lateral growth. There were a few fish losses. In particular the bloodfin tetras were down in number; however, I was pleased that most of the fish were doing well. At this point I asked Ms. M to begin feeding the same amount but to now feed once daily. The fish were looking fine, but after speaking with Ms. M, I learned that she was, on some days, too busy to remember to feed the fish. With the revised instruction

to feed every day, she thought that she or a few responsible students could get the daily feedings accomplished.

This subtropical setup worked because of the hardiness of the fish and the ease of purchasing them over 1 day of shopping. The plants and LED lighting also proved to be a contributing factor to the health of the fish and the appearance of the tank. The subtropical fish also benefited from the high oxygen content provided by air-driven box filter and air stone. Ms. M mentioned that she and the students liked the white noise produced by the filters, which was a benefit that I had not thought would be noticed or appreciated by the students. I attribute the ultimate success of this subtropical setup to the welcoming attitude of Ms. M and to her attention to detail in feeding the fish sparing amounts. At my urging, she also stood firm and rejected offers from students who wished to add more fish to the tank. By keeping the numbers of fish rather low, the water quality could remain high.

If I had to do it again, I would have purchased the fish about 2 weeks prior to transferring them to the classroom tank. This would have reduced the stress on the fish and would have provided a period of quarantine for the overall fish community. I was taking a gamble by transferring the fish so quickly over 3 days, and I was lucky that none of the fish carried a contagious disease into the tank, which would have been a regrettable setback.

Because of my established volunteer relationship with this particular school, I was fortunate to play a part in making this subtropical aquarium a success for the students' enjoyment and inquiry in the 2017-2018 academic year. The school's principal also knew and trusted me because of my daughter's passage through the school 7 years earlier. However, I believe that any experienced tropical fish hobbyist, without a prior relationship to a local school, could also approach their local school's principal (or science teacher) with a similar proposal—to let them know that you are experienced and interested in assisting with the setup and monthly maintenance of a fish tank—and it is likely that such an inquiry would produce a similar relationship that would pay off for both the hobbyist and the students alike.

I bid on a bag of *Apistogramma cacatoides* and there were a trio of fish in the bag. I won the bid. These South American Dwarf Cichlids were no longer than 1-1/2 inches.

I bought these cichlids at Greater Pittsburgh's auction last fall in Monroeville, Pennsylvania. I placed them in a ten gallon tank and the following

morning there were a total of eight fry in the aquarium.

These fish bred extremely well for me, however they were not a pretty fish at all. The *Apistogrammas* were sort of a drabby color. The water was extremely hard and I was surprised the dwarf cichlids bred so easily.
